

From September 2022 to May 2023, grade 4 students from Chief Harold Sappier Memorial Elementary School created this book to share a little about their wolastoqey culture. With the help of their language teacher Jessica Thibodeau and Youth Fusion coordinator Maria Nazareth Araújo, students wrote and illustrated four different books – each one of them based on a different theme.


Each page of every book contains a word in wolastoqey, the language of the wolastoqiyik, as well as its translation to English. The goal with these books is to share the knowledge and to keep the wolastoqey language alive.

The land in which this book was written is on the traditional unceded territory of the Wolastoqiyik, Mi'kmaq and Peskotomuhkati peoples. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which these nations first signed with the British Crown in 1726. The treaties did not deal with the surrender of lands and resources, but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.


